# **CCA Presents Awards**

AT THE CCA WINTER DINNER in New York, held at the New York Yacht Club on January 16, 2007, the following awards were presented:

#### Blue Water Medal

Founded in 1923
– for the most meritorious example of seamanship from amateurs of all
nations

The Blue Water Medal for 2006 was awarded to **Minoru Saito**, who at

the age of 71 completed his seventh singlehanded circumnavigation of the world in his 50' sloop, Shutendohji II. His 15-year-old boat first raced around the globe in the 1990-91 B0C and has been sailing almost continuously in solo world-circling races and voyages ever since. His latest voyage, which ended on June 6, 2005 in Japan, completed 215,000 miles at sea. He received an enthusiastic standing ovation as Commodore Rowland presented

him with the CCA's most prestigious award.

Minoru Saito began serious sailing in 1973 at the age of 39 by participating in races in Japan. Thirteen years later he purchased a 43' sailboat in Australia and entered several grueling races between Australia, New Zealand and Japan, including the Melbourne to Osaka Race, Around Australia Single-handed Race (where he suffered a heart attack, forcing him to retire Continued on page 7

#### **Summer Cruise '08**

Lofoten Islands, Norway July 12-24

The Lofotens, about 100 miles above the Arctic Circle off the northwest coast of Norway, are washed by the Gulf Stream and enjoy a mostly moderate climate. The weather the last several summers has been generally sunny and warm during the day (60's and low 70's), with minimal rain; the wise mariner, however, comes prepared with longies, fleeces, & foul weather gear, since weather can turn wet and cold. In mid-July the sun will barely dip below the horizon, allowing for long days of coastal cruising and exploration afloat and ashore.

Sixteen sailboats are reserved - Jeanneaus, Dufours and Bavarias, some crewed - and there may be trawlers, as well. There will be 2-3 large coastal schooners that will accommodate 10-15 passengers each. After the cruise, there will be an optional stopover in Oslo. Alternatively, there may be a trip on the old mail boat up to the North Cape, near the Russian border. 

# Past Commodore John Lee Merrill, Jr. 1927-2007





Past Commodore John L. Merrill, Jr. of Little Cranberry Island, Maine, died on Sunday, January 7, age 79, in Portland after a long illness. Jack was born in Boston on June 18, 1927, son of John Lee Merrill and Katherine Langdon Hill Merrill. He grew up in Augusta, Maine in the house at 136 State Street built by his maternal grandfather, the late Governor John F. Hill.

After graduating from the Canterbury School in Connecticut in 1945, Jack enlisted in the Naval Reserve. Although WWII ended while he was still in training, he served in the Pacific aboard the PC 1144 and later aboard the survey vessel USS Bowditch. He assisted in revising the charts of Bikini Atoll and witnessed the first atomic bomb test there. He would tell a story of

steering the 386' USS Bowditch through rough seas when he was only 18 and was commended by the Captain for his skill.

Jack graduated from Harvard College in 1950. He then did stock analysis and research in Boston at Keystone Custodian and Coffin and Burr, becoming self-employed in the 1960s as trustee for several private accounts. With his family, he lived in Westwood, Massachusetts, serving on several town committees, as treasurer of Dexter School and President of SEA Education Association of Woods Hole in its early years.

He lived in Franconia, New Hampshire for a few years, came back to Boston, and then moved to Charleston, South Carolina, and recently back to Maine to be near his children. All his summers were spent on beautiful family land on Little Cranberry Island, Maine, which overlooked the water to Mt. Desert Island and Northeast Harbor.

From 1954 to 1992, Jack sailed in 20 consecutive Newport Bermuda Races as crew, captain or navigator. He skippered and navigated two of his own boats in several races – an Alden Caravelle, *Excalibur*, and a Jim McCurdy design, *Bellatrix*, finishing second in class twice. He also sailed in several Marblehead Halifax and Monhegan Island races.

Every year there was the annual cruise aboard *Bellatrix* or *Excalibur* from Newport or the Cape to Cranberry Island. On one such cruise, Jack calculated that it would only be 14 extra miles to stop in Boothbay to load up on a summer's supply of fudge. A necessary stop! Jack was a charter member and past commodore of Little Cranberry Island Yacht Club, where he and Helen enjoyed sailing and racing Mercurys and Bullseyes or just sailing off to find whales near Mt. Desert Rock.

Rosita and I had the pleasure of chartering with Helen and Jack in the Virgin Islands and Scotland and held Jack's friendship and allaround nautical capabilities in the utmost respect. I was in his crew twice to Bermuda and had the pleasure of beating him to Halifax once. He cared a great deal for the CCA and put a lot of effort into it as treasurer, vice commodore and commodore. He is missed by many friends and shipmates. Our admiration and affection go out to Helen, who showed so much courage and strength in caring for Jack these past many months.

Les Crane's Monterey (BDA) has been in Lisbon for the winter with plans to head into the Western Med in May. Les and crew report having met Steve and Karyn James (FLA) on Threshold in La Corunna last August. The Jameses were planning to winter in Lagos with Walt and Evelyn Paul (NYS) on Nefertari.

Eric Forsyth (NYS) on Fiona arrived at northern Brazil in September, and after a crew change, worked down the coast to Uruguay. In Piriapolis he ran into CCAers Betsy and Bob Baillie, whose boat Belair was on the hard while they flew to Australia. After a brief stop in Argentina he arrived in Port Stanley, Falkland Islands, in time for Christmas. From Port Stanley Fiona sailed to the South Shetlands. He inspected the penguins and seals and visited two international research bases at several anchorages before arriving at Port Lockroy, Antarctica to find another CCA yacht anchored there - Pelagic Australis with Skip Novak (GLS) aboard and a full load of charterers. He sailed through the spectacular LeMaire Strait and southwest to the Grandidier Channel. At 65°35' S they ran into fairly dense floating ice and, as Fiona is fiberglass, Eric thought it prudent

# Have you seen this bird?

The Manomet Center for Conservation Sciences, USGS and Canadian Wildlife Service are collaborating to develop focused boat-based and aerial surveys for Rednecked Phalaropes that stage in the Bay of Fundy. This is a project involving many

researchers and agencies with the aim of addressing the bird's near total disappearance from migration stopovers in Maritimes Canada Bay of Fundy, where historically flocks totaling in the millions formerly staged in late summer. By 1990, the huge flocks had disappeared. They have not returned.

Their absence has led to concern over the population status of the species overall. Currently, there is not enough information to determine if phalaropes have altered their migration pathways in eastern North America, and the impact of the apparent loss of a migration stopover in this hemisphere is unknown.

Due to limitations inherent in research at sea, collaborative monitoring is the most promising approach to gathering information

on Red-necked Phalaropes in the Fundy region. Therefore, we are seeking the assistance of offshore sailors who can provide valuable information on far-flung gatherings of phalaropes, while formal surveys are underway at areas of focus in the Bay of Fundy. Volunteers are eagerly requested to report in on the locations and numbers of Rednecked Phalaropes they encounter at sea. The added monitoring can help us to unravel the Fundy phalarope mystery!

to backtrack into the open sea west of the Biscoe Islands. Apart from the occasional large iceberg, the sea was clear - and he was able to shape a course south to the Antarctic Circle, crossing 66°34'S at 69°W on January 15. They turned north and headed for the west coast of South America under full gale conditions with sleet and heavy seas. The strong winds did not last, and they

were bedeviled by light and fluky winds associated with a stationary high for much of the trip across the Drake Passage and up the coast of Chile. At 50°S in the Pacific, Eric figured they had rounded Cape Horn westabout, even though they anchored a few times on the way! Fiona arrived at Ancud, Chile, on January 31. from the race) and the Auckland-Fukuoka Race. Between races, while sailing from Japan to Sydney, he survived a typhoon, two cyclones and several knockdowns from gale-force winds.

In 1991 he acquired Shutendohji II, a solidly-built 50' bluewater cruiser from Australia which was modified for long-distance solo ocean racing. To qualify and participate in the third BOC round-theworld race, he sailed from Sydney to Newport, RI, then in the race itself. In 1994 he sailed from Japan to Charleston, SC to participate in the fourth BOC, then back to Japan via the Red Sea, thus completing two circumnavigations in one continuous trip. In 1997 he sailed from Japan to England via Australia then the Cape of Good Hope, in the Singlehanded Transatlantic race between Falmouth, England and Charleston, and then participated in the fifth BOC, renamed the Around Alone. On returning to Japan, via Cape Town and Tasmania, he had completed his sixth circumnavigation.

His latest voyage, dubbed "Challenge-7," began in Tokyo in October 2004, taking the form of an informal contest between him and Japanese singlehander Kenichi Horie. Saito completed the route without stopping 7½ months later,

on June 6, 2005, - a few days ahead of Horie - to notch up his seventh circumnavigation.

While seldom among the winners and sailing an aging boat, Minoru Saito has always sailed without sponsorship with a sparsely funded budget and with a long-running heart ailment. His persistence, cheerful attitude and indomitable spirit have been recognized and praised in yachting circles all over the world.

#### Far Horizons Award

To a member for a particularly meritorious cruise or series of cruises exemplifying the objectives of the Club

The Far Horizons Award was presented to Larry and Maxine Bailey for their adventurous, full time cruising aboard their 43' sloop, Shingebiss II, during the past 14 years, which began by sailing to Kiska Island in the Aleutians then on to a full circuit of the world including Cape Horn, cruises in the Mediterranean and the Baltic, around the Cape of Good Hope and Cape Leeuwin, then across the length of the Pacific and back to Kiska Island, in all a voyage of 93,000 miles.

## Rod Stephens Trophy

The Rod Stephens Trophy for Outstanding Seamanship was awarded to the crew of ABN AMRO II for superb seamanship in carrying out the attempted rescue of an overboard crewmember at night in the North Atlantic during the Volvo Ocean Race, while sailing in 25-30 knots of wind. While ultimately unsuccessful in saving his life, the crew located his body by acting quickly, following good, previously rehearsed procedures and using excellent judgment in carrying out search tactics. Following recovery of the victim, who was not wearing a harness or PFD, strenuous and well-advised efforts were made to revive him but were ultimately in vain because of an apparent head injury which may have rendered him unconscious at the time he went overboard.

## Richard S. Nye Trophy

To a member who has brought distinction to the Club by outstanding service, seamanship, performance in long-distance cruising or racing, statesmanship in international yachting, or any combination of these.

The Richard S. Nye Trophy was awarded to Garry Fischer for service to the Club as RC of the Boston Station, years as the CCA Fleet Surgeon, and special service to the sport of sailing. His medical presentations to safety at sea seminars for the sailing community at large and for the Newport Bermuda Race and his ongoing medical studies researching head trauma and other sailing-related injuries, his recommendations to prevent and treat accidents while underway at sea have all directly enhanced the CCA's core mission in support of amateur sailing. In addition, his transoceanic passages and many other voyages make him a model CCA member, as do his continuous efforts to enhance our membership and support our club events.

# Charles H. Vilas Literary Prize

The Charles H. 

# Ham Radio Qualifications Revised The big news in the world of Ham

radio is that Morse code will no longer be required for Amateur radio licenses. The General Amateur Radio Class has always required the ability to receive and send Morse code.

The FCC announced intent to modify requirements on December 15. The plan was to rescind code requirements for General and Amateur Extra classes. The intent to change was posted in the Federal Register on January 24 and unless rescinded, the change was to become effective February 23. Cell Phones - The USCG has asked cell phone providers to discontinue the key sequence "CG" used to request emergency assistance. The reason given was patchy service areas. This applies to all states except for Alaska.



Gloomy mountains climbed into the gathering darkness; falls frozen to cliffs. Our cabin was a warm refuge.

Sunday morning. Dark and quiet. The silence of fresh snow. Fourteen inches on deck and snowing. Shore to shore ice in the inlet. Temperature holding at 34°. If the temperature drops, what then? Annabelle idled down the Inlet leaving a black trail on the white surface. Once outside we saw that sheet ice completely covered Jervis Inlet. We pushed along on a slow bell when abruptly the engine overheated. Slush ice had plugged the raw water filter. We cleared it and proceeded. Half an hour later we were free. When we moored in Garden Bay

the temperature was a balmy 47°. Our snow blanket evaporated."

# New Book by Bob Van Blaricom

Robert Van Blaricom, Time and Tide: A Nautical Memoir. 310 pages, illustrated. Available from www.lulu.com. \$25 paperback, \$13.82 download.


Toward the end of his engaging sailing autobiography, CCA member Bob Van Blaricom tells us his solution to the problem of creating a happy existence for oneself. First, go sailing with a purpose for two years. Then take a year off. Finally, head off again for another two years. You could have fooled me. If I have read his wonderful book correctly, there has been almost nonstop adventuring since a certain

teenager just off the train from Idaho

took a leaky skiff out into Raccoon

Straits off Tiburon, California.

Time and Tide is the page-turner of a memoir by a spirited man who wants us to share his delight in sailing to and enjoying new places in interesting boats. The breadth of his experience is hinted at by the chapter titles, each the name of a boat. Chapter 1, An Unnamed Skiff, gets us started on the right (if damp) foot. Ballerina (chapter 5) is the reverse-sheer 23-footer in which Bob and Jane took their honeymoon and cruised the Delta. Three chapters later comes Armorel, a hefty wooden cutter that carried them 11,000 miles from England to California. Something else entirely is Sea Bear (chapter 13), a steel cutter that Bob built and sailed to Australia and Alaska. Fifteen boats and 60 years on, we have Cloud Nine, the 57-footer in which owner Roger Swanson, Bob, and several other Californians made an unsuccessful



try at transiting the Northwest Passage in 2005.

In between come stories of a wondrous range of vessels that Bob worked or crewed on, owned, built, or otherwise enjoyed. Ocean races to Hawaii and Tahiti, Atlantic and Pacific crossings, East Coast and Great Lakes cruises, little voyages up California's rivers and canals, big ones to Alaska or Baja – all fine stories told very well, with attention paid equally to boats and people. Some cruising writers, alas, ignore the men and women they meet. Bob remembers temporary neighbors as clearly as he does tidal ranges and torn sails.

When we last see our author, he is 76 years old and on Baja California, happily hitchhiking to La Paz after being dropped off from a 30-footer that he has just helped sail, doublehanded, down from San Francisco. "It had," he writes, "been an interesting trip." One of dozens.


and of course a listing of all guest moorings.
