ARRIVING IN PHUKET

When you step out of the terminal at Phuket International be prepared for the chaos of many east Asian airports. It will probably be late at night. You'll be jet-lagged and hot. And taxi drivers will hustle you, mostly politely but insistently, for your business. For all these reasons, we suggest that you pre-arrange a pick-up with your hotel in a nice comfy air-conditioned van.

If you do take a taxi, go to the "Metered Taxi" stand to the right as you walk out the door. They will charge a 100 baht airport tax, but that is entirely legit. You should also make sure your driver knows where you are going before you get in.

CRUISE CENTRAL

"Cruise Central" is the Angsana Laguna Phuket Resort. (10 Moo 4 Srisoonthorn Road Cherngtalay, Amphur Talang, Phuket 83110 Thailand Tel: +66 76 324 101 Fax: +66 76 324 108 lagunaphuket@angsana.com)

Registration, the Skippers' Briefing and the opening and closing parties will be held here.

Located on the shores of Bang Tao Bay in the northwest of Phuket Island, Angsana Laguna Phuket is just a 20-minute drive away from Phuket International Airport and from Phuket town. It is part of Laguna Phuket, an integrated resort, consisting of five luxury hotels, six palm-fringed lagoons and a swimming pool that just won't quit.


Location:

Anchor in 10 meters on the sandy bottom well offshore from the jetty in LANA BAY on the NW end of Phi Phi Don. You can take your dinghy to the jetty in the northern

part of the bay, which leads to a footpath and a ten minute stroll to P.P. Erawan Palms Resort. Alternatively, hail one of the longtails that we will have available to take you from your boat to the jetty.

Temperatures:

We'll be cruising during the Northeast Monsoons, which is actually the dry season. By now, you must be aware that we're not going to Spitzbergen, so expect some heat (mid-eighties), some humidity (actually lots), and some rain shower activity (usually at night).

Winds:

Reefing probably won't be an issue. Motoring might. Your SCC experienced 10-15kts with a couple of days of FAC. The prevailing direction is NE.

Seas:

The Andaman Sea is pretty sheltered during this time of year but be aware of an annoying swell (usually SW), which can work its way into certain anchorages.

Passports and Visas:

A valid passport for each passenger is compulsory. Expiration date must be no earlier than 6 months after your planned return. No Visa is required if you have proof of onward passage and stay less than 30 days.

Telephone:

The Thailand country code is 66

If you want to save a buck or two, pick up a local pre-paid SIM

card or cheap phone at the airport when you arrive.

We will do a grand cell phone number exchange at the Skippers' meeting and publish the list.

Pets:

Taking pets into Thailand requires a fair amount of bureaucracy. See http://www.pettravel.com for details. We suggest it's easier to leave Fifi at home and clean the rugs when you return.

Firearms:

It's virtually impossible to take firearms into Thailand. ...same, incidentally, for porn and hemp.

Local Drinking Water:

While the local water probably won't send you to the head screaming for God's Good Mercy, it's better not to drink it. At most reputable places, ice will have been purified before freezing. On the boats, the tank water is OK for washing veggies, but stick to bottled water for drinking. Rum? ...even better. Most recommend drinking 1.5 liters a day in the tropics. Water, that is.

History of the Area:

The following was unabashedly lifted from http://asianhistory.about.com

Modern humans first settled the area that is now Thailand in the Paleolithic Era, perhaps as early as 100,000 years ago. For up to 1 million years prior to the arrival of Homo sapiens, the region was home to Homo erectus such as Lampang Man, whose fossilized remains were discovered in 1999.

The early kingdoms were ethnically Malay, <u>Khmer</u>, and Mon. Regional rulers vied with one another for resources and land, but all were displaced when the Thai people immigrated into the area from southern China.

Around the 10th century A.D. ethnic Thais invaded, fighting off the governing Khmer empire and establishing the Sukhothai Kingdom (1238-1448), and its rival, the Ayutthaya Kingdom (1351-1767). Over time, the Ayutthaya grew more powerful, subjecting the Sukhothai and dominating most of southern and central Thailand.

In 1767, an invading Burmese army sacked the Ayutthaya capital and divided up the kingdom. The Burmese held central Thailand for only two years before they were defeated in turn by the Siamese leader General Taksin. Taksin soon went mad, and was replaced by Rama I, the founder of the Chakri Dynasty which continues to rule Thailand today. Rama I moved the capital to its present site at Bangkok.

During the nineteenth century, the Chakri rulers of Siam watched European colonialism sweep across neighboring countries of Southeast and Southern Asia. Burma and Malaysia became British, while the French took <u>Vietnam</u>, Cambodia, and <u>Laos</u>. Siam alone, through skilled royal diplomacy and internal strength, was able to fend off colonization.

In 1932, the military forces staged a coup d'etat that transformed the country into a constitutional monarchy. Nine years later, the Japanese invaded the country, inciting the Thais to attack and take Laos from the French. Following Japan's defeat in 1945, the Thais were forced to return the land they'd taken.

The current monarch, King Bhumibol Adulyadej, came to the throne in 1946 after the mysterious shooting death of his older brother. Since 1973, power has moved from military to civilian hands repeatedly.

LOCAL ETIQUETTE

The Wai

Your SCC found the Thais to be a beautiful and gentle people. (Which is not to say your pocket can't be beautifully and gently picked at the airport.)

The nature of the people can be summed up by the Wai: placing your hands palm-to-palm at your chest and bowing your head. It is a wonderful gesture of respect, greeting, and thanks. If you feel as awkward, as your SCC did, in doing it, a simple smile and nod works as well.

Chai-Yen

Chai-Yen is a Thai philosophy of calm and acceptance. Getting steamed at a taxi driver or hotel clerk will only get you a polite stare. It is exactly the wrong way to get what you want.

Dress:

Recognizing the CCA is not a cut-off jeans and strapper tee-shirt crowd, just be aware that Thais, many of whom are Muslim, are pretty conservative in their dress and lose respect for those foreigners who are not.

Important to Know:

The King: His Majesty King Bhumibol Adulyadej is almost universally revered by Thai nationals and held in the highest level of regard and admiration as evidenced by his picture prominently displayed throughout the Kingdom. The national law prohibits any act, verbal, physical or written, that shows insolent or disrespectful behavior toward any member of the Royal family.

If this law applied to US politicians there would be nothing on cable TV.

Therefore, out of respect for His Majesty and laws of the Kingdom,

NEVER say or do anything disrespectful of the King or any member of the royal family, even to the extent of stomping on a Thai coin or banknote which has been dropped and is rolling/blowing away. All banknotes and coins in Thailand bear a portrait of His Majesty, and to be stomped on by your foot would be considered extremely disrespectful.

Taxis: When attempting to hail a taxi, it is customary and polite to keep your arm extended outwards, your hand facing horizontal with palm-side down. Signaling a taxi by holding your hand with fingers "up" is considered rude. Similarly, whistling, clicking fingers or making other type noises to attract a person's attention is considered rude. Such methods are considered only appropriate for animals, such as a dog.

Temples and Monks: When visiting temples, please remember that these are active places of worship. Accordingly, make sure that you dress conservatively. For women, clothing should include long skirts or trousers, with no bare shoulders or knees. Some temples have a no-photography policy or limit the use of flash photography. Before taking any pictures please inquire about limitations and restrictions.

When entering any place of worship, always remove your shoes. In many Asian cultures the feet are considered the lowest and dirtiest part of the body, whereas the head is regarded as the highest. Therefore, DO NOT sit with your feet pointing towards an image of Buddha. If possible, you should sit either cross-legged or with your feet tucked behind you. DO NOT use your feet to point, move objects or point to a person's head. Your feet must never touch another person's head or touch a Monk. Your feet should only be used for walking.

Special Note for Women: Women must NEVER in any way, shape or form touch a Monk. If a female needs to pass an item to a Monk, it must be either passed to another male (not a monk) first, or placed down for the Monk to retrieve himself. There must never be direct contact between a Monk and a female.

Public Displays of Affection: Overt displays of kissing, cuddling etc., in plain public view are frowned upon. Probably not a big issue with our crowd, but with Viagra, etc., you never know...

The Head: Touching someone on the head, even in fun "can" be offensive and is considered rude (except among good friends). You would NEVER dare touch someone's head with your foot.

Taking Photos: Just as you wouldn't like a stranger walking up to you and snapping your photo, be respectful and ask first before doing the same in Thailand especially with Monks. Note that some rural hill-tribe people believe that a photograph will 'capture' their soul and will object to being photographed.

Banks & Money Exchange:

The airport is the easiest place to exchange money, however, there are banks and ATM machines at the Tesco supermarket. Moneychangers are located at Ao Nang beach and on Phi-Phi Don, although the exchange rates may not be as good.

Currency:

Exchange Rate for the Thai Baht (THB) is about 31 THB to 1 USD.

For those of us who don't think well on our feet, this means:

US \$1 = 31 Bahts US \$10 = 310 Bahts US \$100 = 3,100 Bahts

10 Bahts = \$0.32 100 Bahts = \$3.20 1000 Bahts = \$32.00

ATM's are scarce at best, and non-existent on the cruising ground. Many of the wonderful little island restaurants, gift shops, etc., only take cash, so get all the cash you'll need when you arrive. Your SCC went through about 1000 THB (\$32) per person per day.

Credit cards are accepted only at larger restaurants and resorts.

Tipping:

Tipping is not required and, mostly, not expected in Thailand. But, given that Americans are genetically driven to tip, here are some guidelines:

In Taxis: Round up to the next 10THB.

Incidentally, outside of Bangkok, you should establish the taxi rate before you get into the cab.

In Restaurants: 10% is fine. It may be on the bill.

In Hotels: Porters/ Bell staff 20-50THB, Room Cleaners 20-30THB per day.

Professional Services: For services such as masseurs and hairdressers a gratuity of 20THB to 100THB depending on the individual situation would be appropriate. Tour guides who provide an exceptional (group) experience could be recognized with perhaps a 100THB tip. Tour guides and drivers when taking a private one-on-one service, and where the experience was exceptional, consider a tip for the driver of around 200THB – 300THB, and guide around 400THB – 500THB.

Electricity Information:

Electricity in Thailand is 220V, alternating at 50 cycles per second. If you travel to Thailand with a device that does not accept 220V at 50 Hertz, you will need a voltage converter.

Time:

This gets complicated. Thailand is in the Eastern Hemisphere on the other side of the International Dateline. That makes it closer to New York than San Francisco at GMT + 7 hours.

From the Thailand to:

Eastern Time Zone: Subtract 12 hours Central Time Zone: Subtract 13 hours Mountain Time Zone: Subtract 14 hours Pacific Time Zone: Subtract 15 hours

Add an hour to US time for Daylight Savings Time. (Thailand does not use Daylight Savings Time.)

Language:

Your SCC was hopeless at the language, so you're on your own here.

Here's the extent of our Thai:

"Hello" (to a male): sah-way-dee-kup

"Hello" (to a female): sah-wah-dee-kah

"Thank you": cop-koon

If you think speaking Thai is tough, try reading it!

Vaccinations:

Nothing extraordinary required, but check out http://wwwnc.cdc.gov/travel/destinations/thailand.htm to be sure to contact your doctor. Thailand is generally risk-free of contagious disease.

LOCAL TRIPS

Hongs:

Going to the Andaman Sea around Phuket and not seeing a **Hong** is like going to Paris and skipping the Eiffel Tower or visiting Scotland and not going to a McDonalds. These unique towering rock islands have to be experienced from the interior lagoons by sea canoe. So be sure to plan a trip to the hongs before or after the cruise. Information at

www.seacanoe.net or at the hotel concierge.

Elephants:

There is a little charmer who wanders around the Angsana with her handler. If you are more adventurous, you can climb aboard an elephant for a nature stroll at Siam Safari see

www.siamsafari.com

Or ask the concierge.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

Phuket International Airport, Angsana Lagoon Resort, Ao Po Grand Marina (Moorings/Sun sail), and Yacht Haven Marina at Laem Phrao (other charters and crewed yachts) look deceptively close to each other on the map, but the travel time is considerable due to traffic, road conditions, etc.

As we mentioned, we recommend arranging Airport-to-Hotel transportation with your hotel.

Moorings/Sunsail will provide van service from the Angsana to their docks on a schedule that coincides with boat check-in times. (More about that when you arrive.)

Transportation to Yacht Haven Marina for those with other charters and those on crewed yachts should be arranged with your hotel or charter company.

Note: We found the taxi drivers were pretty clueless about the locations of the two marinas most of us will be using, and they have no idea about charter companies. So it's a good idea to know exactly where you're headed. It would be a real bummer to spend the whole cruise driving around in a taxi looking for your boat.

Car Rental

If you are brave or crazy enough to rent a car and drive yourself, we've heard that David Car Rent, www.davidcarrent.com and Airport Car Rent, www.airportcarrent.com are among the few companies that rent self-drive mini-buses.

SOUVENIR SHOPPING

Can't come back empty-handed?

Jatujak Market is the biggest market in Phuket, with over 1,000 stalls. On Chaofa West Road from Central Shopping Mall, heading south toward Chalong Bay, turn left at the first traffic light – Sat. and Sun. 4:30 - 8:30.

This is a typical Thai bazaar, featuring all sorts of items from fish to clothing. Thai silk is on the top of most visitors' shopping lists. It is sold in a range of colors, and in various widths, lengths and thicknesses, or as bespoke products such as shirts, blouses, men's suits and ladies' silk jackets, bedcovers and furnishings. Some of the most popular silk items in Phuket include handkerchiefs, scarves, pillowcases, photo frames, handbags, cosmetic bags and evening bags. Jewelry: gold, Thai sapphires and pearls from local pearl farms are available everywhere.

CRUISING IN THE ANDAMAN SEA

The Andaman Sea, with Phuket as its hub, is Thailand's reigning maritime jewel. Here you will find some of the most beautiful islands and beaches in the region.

As mentioned, the Moorings Cruise Guide contains an enormous amount of local information, chartlets and suggested routes. It is available to all CCA cruisers, Moorings or not, and will be available at check-in, or you can download it now at:

Here is an overview of this wonderful cruising ground:

Phang Nga Bay to the north of the AoPo Marina is a marine national park and an area of beautiful, uninhabited islands, secluded anchorages and soaring cliffs fringed with exotic flora. James Bond Island is in this section.

The SW bay and W side of *Koh Phanak* is interesting to explore by dinghy under spectacular limestone over-hangs. The hongs (Thai for "room") are great for kayaking through the tunnel access. *Koh Hong* has a hong (which gives the island its name) with a beautiful enclosed pool with a large chimney opening to the sky.

On the way to *Koh Roi* you can drop anchor at *Koh Yang* where there is a small community of thatched houses on the beach and purchase coconuts, fish, crabs, or prawns.

As you travel south the seas will turn turquoise and white sand beaches will appear.

The main beach at *Ao Nang* is reasonably well developed and has access to *Krabi* town by local transport. The beaches and scenery are fantastic with excellent snorkeling. There are many Thai restaurants and bars.

Koh Dam Group or Chicken Islands have good snorkeling, with coral reefs to explore.

Koh Phi Phi Don has Internet cafes, restaurants and bars. At nearby Koh Phi Phi Le you can see Maya Bay (where The Beach was filmed), a scenic sandy lagoon with white sandy beaches surrounded by limestone cliffs. It is pretty but overrun by day boats from the hotels. Viking Cave is well known for its bird nests, which are harvested by locals to make the famous 'Birds Nest Soup'.

Koh Lanta is often described as Phuket 20 years ago with a relaxed and easy going pace of life. There are two good beaches along the West Coast and good shelter in some beautiful anchorages on the East Coast during the SW season. The islands to the south have good snorkeling and the "Emerald Cave" on Ko Muk is a must-see.

The Ko Rok group marks the southern edge of the standard cruising area. Koh Racha Yai and Racha Noi which lie to the south

of Phuket, offer more good snorkeling and diving, as well as the relaxed pace of tropical island life.

On the way back to the Phuket Island's East coast, sail by many islands, mangroves, beaches to the *Koh Rang Yai* anchorage. Passing the south end of Phuket island provides three of the most famous diving destinations in the region. *Koh Rang Yai* is a bonus stopover with full recreation facilities, restaurants, canoes, mountain bikes, trails and snorkeling.

As we mentioned earlier, this is an open itinerary cruise. Except for the Mid-Cruise Rendezvous, you're on your own. At the Skippers' meeting on Thursday, we'll provide lots of information for you to plan your cruise.

In anticipation of that, here is a general routing overview:

- 1. For shorter underway days and a concentration of the more popular islands in Phang Nga Bay, Krabi and Phi Phi Don, stay in the northern area near the Moorings/ Sunsail base.
- 2. For longer underway days and fewer cruisers/tourists, travel farther south to Koh Lanta and Ko Muc. Your SCC took this route and loved it, but we travelled 20-30 nm a day.
- 3. For the more adventurous, Ko Racha and the West Coast will really get you off the beaten path. Night sailing is OK with Moorings if you plan longer passages but make sure you clear it with them.

ANCHORING/MOORINGS

If that empty mooring ball looks oh-so tempting to tie up to, just slap yourself back to reality and anchor. Local moorings are notoriously unreliable, and the holding is generally excellent in sand, so use your own hook.

Also, remember the tide runs 3 meters or so. Lay out scope accordingly. As mentioned before, there are ground swells that sneak into the anchorages. Get a sense of how they are running before you settle in and start serving the run and tonics.

Most anchorages have no provision for getting ashore or tying up to a dinghy dock. Luckily, our SCC found beach landings pretty easy. Did I mention the 3m tides?

DANGERS OF THE SEA

There are some stinging sea nettles in the cruising ground, so look before you leap. Have some vinegar aboard in case you get stung. Urine works too, but....YUK!

Your SCC was told there were sea snakes around but they are more scared of you than you are of them... So, I guess, don't bite them.

Of course, shallow water may be home for sea urchins and spiny fish.

There is one potentially very DEADLY CREATURE you almost certainly will encounter:

BEWARE THE TOURIST BOAT DRIVER!!!

Rules of the road? Fugetaboudit!!

FISHING HAZARDS

Of course, our cruising ground is a Thai fisherman's place of business. So we should respect him and his gear.

Fishing nets are marked with flagged buoys. They are about 200m long and stand 1.5 m off the bottom. It is always best to sail around them. If you foul a net you are expected to compensate the fisherman (about 3000THB).

Larger trawlers sometimes work in pairs and drag a net between them. Give them all a wide berth.

COMMUNICATIONS ON THE WATER

We will operate a VHF Daily Net: Ch. 74 at 0930.

Ch. 16 is the international Hailing and Distress Channel but, as in many parts of the world, don't count on it.

Having said that, VHF communications can get kind of sketchy in the area but, believe it or not, cell phone coverage is excellent.

You might pick up a local pre-paid SIM card or cheap phone at the airport when you arrive.

We will do a grand cell phone number exchange at the Skippers' meeting and publish the list.

NAVIGATION

Navigating by Seaman's Eye in the area is pretty straightforward. Most of the boats are equipped with local charts and chart plotters. Your SCC did note that the removable data cards with chart details were, in fact, removed.

Navionics Australasia (\$43.99) is an excellent app for iPhones or iPads for the tech junkies among us.

Speaking of which, there is good WiFi at the Angsana Resort and Moorings base. If you have a real problem letting go, there is an available laptop receiver with a local SIM card.

In ancient times, sailors went "where there be no monsters." Later, trade routes dictated sea travel. Today, we plan our cruises around WiFi Hotspots!

WEATHER RESOURCES

We can expect the weather to be fair, but surprise systems do roll in. Moorings will provide you with a week's forecast from www.windguru.cz, which you can update at Internet cafes in Ao Nang, Phi Phi, Lanta, and Krabi or by calling Moorings.

English speaking FM radio stations: 89.5, 90.5, 91.5 provide local weather each morning.

ON-THE-WATER EMERGENCIES

The Thai Navy and Marine Police monitor Ch. 16, but response is iffy. This is another good reason to have a cell phone aboard.

PROVISIONING

If you are a Mooring/Sunsail Charter, you're in luck. The Local office uses an A La Carte system that allows you to pre-order specific items. Non-perishables will be delivered to your boat before you arrive and perishables will be delivered after you are aboard. Just go to http://cca-sf.org/siam fill out the comprehensive provisioning list and email it to Moorings/ Sunsail at least two weeks before the cruise.

For non-Moorings/Sunsail charterers, this list is a great planning tool. Contact your charter company or crewed yacht for their provisioning options.

If you are bent on shopping for yourself, the best bet is Tesco, a large western style supermarket. It's important to check for the open/closing times of local stores since Thailand doesn't really operate on a 9-to-5. Even if a store is open, liquor can only be sold between 1100 and 1400 and 1700-Closing.

Your SCC found Tesco to be a great store with wide selections. The meat department was a little weak. Ask your charter company or hotel for other meat options.

One caution! Don't over-provision! Your SCC ate itself silly at

wonderful beach-side restaurants. You will find them at most anchorages (except in Phang Nga Bay, a National Park area with no restaurants or shops).

FUEL, ICE AND WATER

You should not need fuel during the cruise, but the policy for leaving fuel tanks full upon surrendering the boat varies by charter company and will be explained at check-in. Your boat's water tankage should be sufficient for a week's average use, but find out where water is available at check-in. As mentioned before, boat tank water should be fine for washing the veggies, but we wouldn't drink it. Although the boats should all have refrigeration, participants are encouraged to lay in a supply of ice for drinks before departure.
