
Kathleen and I are looking forward spending time with you as we continue our unhurried way around Santa Maria la Antigua and Barbuda.

# **Brief History of Antigua**

It would be difficult to overestimate the impact on Antigua's history of the arrival, one fateful day in 1684, of Sir Christopher Codrington. An enterprising man, Codrington had come to Antigua to find out if the island would support the sort of large-scale sugar cultivation that already flourished elsewhere in the



Caribbean. His initial efforts proved to be quite successful, and over the next fifty years sugar cultivation on Antigua exploded. By the middle of the 18th century the island was dotted with more than 150 cane-processing windmills--each the focal point of a sizeable plantation. Today almost 100 of these picturesque stone towers remain, although they now serve as houses, bars, restaurants and shops. At Betty's Hope, Codrington's original sugar estate, visitors can see a fully-restored sugar mill.

Most Antiguans are of African lineage, descendants of slaves brought to the island centuries ago to labor in the sugarcane fields. The earliest European contact with the is-

land was made by Christopher Columbus during his second Caribbean voyage (1493), who sighted the island in passing and named it after Santa Maria la Antigua, the miracle-working saint of Seville. European settlement, however, didn't occur for over a century, largely because of Antigua's dearth of fresh water and abundance of determined Carib resistance. Finally, in 1632, a group of Englishmen from St. Kitts established a successful settlement, and in 1684, with Codrington's arrival, the island entered the sugar era.

By the end of the eighteenth century Antigua had become an important strategic port as well as a valuable commercial colony. Known as the "gateway to the Caribbean," it was situated in a position that offered control over the major sailing routes to and from the region's rich island colonies. Most of the island's historical sites, from its many ruined fortifications to the impeccably-restored architecture of English Harbourtown, are reminders of colonial efforts to ensure its safety from invasion.

Horatio Nelson arrived in 1784 at the head of the Squadron of the Leeward Islands to develop the British naval facilities at English Harbour and to enforce stringent commercial shipping laws. The first of these two tasks resulted in

construction of Nelson's Dockyard, one of Antigua's finest physical assets; the second resulted in a rather hostile attitude toward the young captain. Nelson spent almost all of his time in the cramped quarters of his ship, declaring the island to be a "vile place" and a "dreadful hole." Serving under Nelson at the time was the future King William IV, for whom the altogether more pleasant accommodation of Clarence House was built.

It was during William's reign, in 1834, that Britain abolished slavery in the empire. Alone among the British Caribbean colonies, Antigua instituted immediate full emancipation rather than a four-year 'apprenticeship,' or waiting period; today, Antigua's Carnival festivities commemorate the earliest abolition of slavery in the British Caribbean.

Emancipation actually improved the island's economy, but the sugar industry of the British islands was already beginning to wane. Until the development of tourism in the past few decades, Antiguans struggled for prosperity. The rise of a strong labour movement in the 1940s, under the leadership of V.C. Bird, provided the impetus for independence. In 1967, with Barbuda and the tiny island of Redonda as dependencies, Antigua became an associated state of the Commonwealth, and in 1981 it achieved full independent status. V.C. Bird is now deceased; his son, Lester B. Bird, was elected to succeed him as prime minister.





## Cruise Itinerary Recommended Sailing Directions and Harbours.

The committee suggests sailing clockwise around Antigua thence to Barbuda and return to Green Island for the Commodore's Cocktail Party. However if the trades are too heavy or the northerly swell forecast unpleasant, yachts may prefer to not go to Barbuda, rather unwind the string from Bird Island counter clockwise around Antigua back up to Green Island for the Commodore's Cocktail Party. NOTE: Charter yachts are required to leave Diamond Bank to starboard headed for Barbuda.



~ Notice of Race ~

#### Brad Willauer: Principal Race Officer aboard S/V Lions Whelp

This casual race is for fun only.

#### 1. Rules

- 1.1 The regatta will be governed by the *rules* as defined in *The Racing Rule of Sailing 2005-2008* (RRS).
- 1.2 The Organizing Authority will be the Cruising Club of America and the Royal Thames Yacht Club.

#### 2. Eligibility and Entry

2.1 Participants must be members of the Cruising Club of America or the Royal Thames Yacht Club or their guests.

#### 3. Schedule of Events

- 3.1 One race is scheduled with the Preparatory Signals at 0950 hours.
- 3.2 Start and Finish will be at Way Point 3 (17.05N, 61.56W) off Five Islands.

#### 4. Sailing Instructions

- 4.1 The format for the Race will be "Bang and Go Back". (see page 9)
- 4.2 Sailing Instructions will be available at registration.
- 4.3 Starting sequence will be a 10 minute format.

#### 5. Venue

West side of Antigua, Way Point 3 (17.05N, 61.56W) off Five Islands.

#### 6. Scoring

- 6.1 Scoring and Prizes will be at the discretion of the Organizing Authority, the Principal Race Officer and Rear Commodore N. McKelvy.
- 6.2 Prizes will be awarded to the top three finishers, should three or more boats compete.

## **Sailing Instructions**

Bang and Go Back Format - all competitors start at the starting signal.

The course and the time interval will be determined by the PRO based on wind direction and velocity, as well as that superior indicator, gut feeling. The course and time interval will be at the sole discretion of the PRO and no whining by the competitors, spectators or sealife is required. The course will be broadcast on VHF 08 at 0815 and 0930 at the starting line.

The starting sequence will be a ten minute format, starting 0949

11 minutes 5 toots on a noise making device

10 minutes Red flag (no tee shirts) with one short horn/gun

6 minutes Red flag comes down; no sound signal

5 minutes Blue flag with one short horn/gun

1 minute Blue flag comes down; one long (2 sec) horn

Start Club burgee flies with horn/gun

Preparatory signal will be at 0950; start at 1000 hours

Duration: The race duration will be no longer than 30 minutes after the finish of the first competitor or 3 hours from the start signal.

All competitors will sail in a somewhat seamanlike fashion for a designated time interval on a designated course. At his discretion, the PRO will then signal via VHF 08 vessels turn and go back to the finish line (which is the same as the starting line).

The finish will be presented as a line between the race committee boat and another mark. Possible marks may be, but are not limited to,

- aids to navigation unlikely
- drop mark tomato or tetrahedron most unlikely
- moored vessel high probability
- stationary dinghy with attractive personnel highest probability


Scoring: Prizes will be awarded to the top three finishers, should three or more boats compete.

#### **Communications**

*VHF*: Communication by VHF should be adequate everywhere. Members of the cruise committee will monitor **VHF Channel 08** every morning from 0800-0830. Cruise announcements, if any, will be broadcast daily at **0815** on Channel 08.

Please note: VHF Channels 66-74 – the usual pleasure craft channels in the USA - are exceptionally busy in Antigua with local traffic. Taxis, restaurants, all kinds of yachts and boats, along with the local citizenry use these channels (and others) for routine communications of every kind.

Your committee has been advised by our charter company that Channel 08 may the best one for us to use each morning – we will try this and will announce any changes as required.

Skippers of bareboat charters should also monitor (when necessary) whatever channel is advised by their particular charter company.

*CELL PHONES*: While cell phone coverage is generally acceptable in Antigua, roaming prices can be confiscatory and cost-effective service will be limited to those who have made arrangements for the right kind of service via appropriate local SIM card, etc. Consult your cruise guide or local knowledge for details.

*INTERNET*: Free WiFi & Internet café locations may be found in many areas; these will be more cost-effective than cellular data cards with roaming service.



#### **Weather and Weather Forecasts**

Significant daily variations in settled Caribbean weather are rare at this time of year. More important are medium-range forecasts extending out several days that may anticipate significant northerly ground swell from distant systems, or a period of unusually strong trade winds. Peter Willauer on *Eight Bells* has agreed to monitor these forecasts and will report at the morning call (0815, Channel 08) when there is something meaningful in the forecast.

The cruise committee expects to provide a "week-ahead" weather briefing at the opening event, and this will be repeated at the first morning call, by VHF.

The main hospital on Antigua is Holberton Hospital, St. Johns (on the NW side of Antigua). (Tel #1-283-462-0251). There is also the Adelin Medical Center, Fort Road, St. Johns.

Dr. Edward Tarlov, CCA BOS member, will be aboard *SENSI* during the cruise and will be available for informal advice. *SENSI* will depart from Jolly Harbor on Saturday March 16 and return there on Friday evening March 21. He will be at the Admiral's Inn in English Harbor the nights of Friday March 21 and Saturday March 22.

Captain Sandy Sunderland, on board *ARABELLA*, has a defibrillator on board. His crew is trained in CPR. Brad Willauer also has a defibrillator on board *LIONS WHELP*.
